The many friends in Volusia county of Mrs. Frank W. Sams, wife of Senator Sams, who has been in a hospital at Jacksonville for a long time, will be pleased to learn that she is much better and has been able to return to her home at New Smyrna.

On Sunday, Rev. Campbell Gray officiating, Marie Elias Cury and Miss Turhia Misch were married. Miss Misch is the sister of S. N. Misch. The contracting parties are Cyrrians, and this was possibly the first marriage ever solemnized between Syrians in Volusia county. Messrs. F. A. Storer and H. J. Wilmshurst witnessed the ceremony.

Mr. Roscoe E. Glass, B.S. of Stetson '09, leaves tonight for his home in Tampa, from which city, after a brief visit, he will go to Chicago University for his degree from that institution. Returning to Stetson in the fall he will take up his new duties as dean of Stetson Hall and the new dormitory, and as instructor in the grammar school.

Silas E. Morris, who was arrested in Daytona the last of the week on a warrant charging the illegal sale of liquor and who was placed under bond of \$500 for his appearance before the Criminal Court, came to DeLand Tuesday. While here, Solicitor Fish heard that Morris did not mean to stay for trial, and therefore had a capias issued from the Criminal Court, on which Morris was again arrested. Up to noon yesterday he had been unable to secure bail and was confined in the Volusia county screen-room.

Only 52 votes were polled at the special tax sub-district election held in DeLand last Saturday. It was found out before Saturday that Captain Bizelle was not eligible to membership on the board, and the name of Dr. W. S. Taylor was substituted. Dr. Taylor, Judge McCrory and Colonel Blane each received 52 votes. For 3 mill tax there were 32 votes; for 2 mills, 5 votes; for 1 mill, 1 vote; for no special levy, 3 votes. J. J. Banta, J. L. Nuckols and Geo. T. Seif were the inspectors of the election.

Perhaps the most pleasing event of entire commencement time was the tribute paid Tuesday night to Daniel J. Blocker. After the exercises in the auditorium, Mr. Blocker was called to the front by President Hulley, who placed his hands on Mr. Blocker's shoulder and acknowledged the debt he owed him for his services to the school, and his loyalty to its officers, during the past five years. Dr. Hulley read a most flattering testimonial from the students, and, on behalf of the students, presented Mr. Blocker eleven volumes of valuable books. The audience showed its appreciation of the testimonial to "Uncle Dan."

The special election for city councilmen will be held on Thursday next. The contest, while good natured in every way, is getting quite interesting. There are three councilmen to elect—one for a two-year term and two for one-year terms each. G. A. Dreka and J. B. Taylor are the candidates for the two-year term, while E. Bly, V. M. Fountain, Geo. T. Haynes and E. L. Hon are the candidates for the short term. Mr. Dreka is at present a member of the board of public works, and, if elected as councilman, will have to resign from the board of public works. As the board of public works has not held a meeting in probably eight years, membership on this board is only an "honor." The gentlemen who are elected as councilmen will find that there's something to do on council, however. Only three of the candidates can be elected, which is a pity, too, as all of them are well qualified and would have the interests of the city at heart. The chances are that the contest will be quite close.

NEW SMYRNA

New Smyrna, June 2.—The city election will take place on July 6, and the primaries will be held in a few days. Major Dimmick is in the field for reelection. J. A. Pines and J. P. Canova are candidates for marshal. So far no candidates have announced for city council.

Howe & Currier, who recently purchased 13,000 acres of land from the Bond Lumber Company, have established an office in this city with Mr. Leidersdorf as agent. Mr. Leidersdorf says they are expecting several hundred settlers down next fall.

A petition to the county commissioners for a new road to connect this section with Orange county is being circulated. The people of Volusia are wide awake to the good roads movement. There is a hard surfaced road now almost the entire length of the county from north to south, and as soon as Brevard builds up to her north line, the gap from Oak Hill to the south line of the county will be completed. We expect before very long to see a hard surfaced road from St. Augustine to Miami. That part of the road through this county already built from Ormond through Daytona and New Smyrna to Oak Hill, is one of the finest roads in the State and affords one of the most beautiful drives to be found anywhere.

Henry Richards, the murderer of Deputy Sheriff Edwards, was located by Hillsborough county authorities in the home of his mother near Tampa the last of the week. The authorities surrounded the house and then made their presence known. The mother came to the door with a lamp, and when she saw the officers she dashed the lamp to the floor. In the melee that followed, with the house in darkness, the officers finally gained an entrance, but found that Richards had disappeared. A search revealed a loose board in the floor, and under this a tunnel underground leading to scrub palmetto near the house. Richards had escaped through this tunnel. Now that they have located his whereabouts, there is little doubt that the murderer will in time be captured.
